Meet our Guest Speaker: Anthony 'Tony' Millet

Tony Millet's mom started his growing career at a very young age, growing everything from seed. Growing up in Brooklyn, NYC, his orchid growing career began delving into cool, intermediate, and warm growing types. Having the experience of growing in underground cold frames to an above ground greenhouse set the tone for his new semi-retirement growing style.



Presently he is growing under plastic covered lathe houses South Florida style, open on all sides, which includes a small greenhouse for early seedlings. His early childhood experience of growing from seed set the tone for his orchid hybridizing program today.

Tony breeds and grows unusual hybrids in the large *cattleya* alliance and performs all flasking activities. He lectures and teaches and is an accredited AOS judge. Many of his hybrids have been AOS awarded and are one of a kind, meaning not cloned or meristemed. His present growing goal is to impart warm tolerance to some of the cooler growing colorful *hadro laelias* now *cattleyas*.

His presentation will be on "Preparing Our Orchids for the Summer". With all the rain, high temperatures, high humidity and potential high winds and hurricanes what can we do to prepare our orchids in our growing area?

"Let's Enjoy Nature's Best - Orchids".

President's Message

My take on growing orchids

I grow them because the flowers make me happy. From every speaker we've had I've learned at least one new thing. From the excellent orchid growers in our Society I've learned a lot as well. From my experience growing orchids at Flamingo Gardens as an Orchidteer and at home, I've learned through heartbreaks and success how I should be growing them. In a not so small nut shell here is part of my current declaration on orchid growing:

- 1. Epiphytic orchids need light, water and air. Air around their leaves and roots, not wind, air. They need something to grab on to securely. A loose orchid can't attach, it will die eventually. Broken down media, choking the air away from the roots, that's a recipe for disaster.
- 2. A regular weekly schedule works magic. Bill Hodnett fertilizes and works on his orchids every Monday. That's on his schedule. When I spend 1 hour a week fertilizing, my plants are stronger, more resistant to pests and diseases and I get flowers. I hate to spray for bugs and diseases so I need to grow strong orchids. When I can't or won't fertilize regularly, it shows. There is always an exception to that somewhere.
- 3. The best kind of fertilizer really is the one that gets used. I change around. Sometimes 20-20-20, sometimes a CalMag formula then maybe a bloom Booster type formula here and there. Epsom salts is important, Maxicrop is great. Slow release fertilizer is very good in moderation.
- 4. Growing orchids is growing roots. Sick roots mean sick and dying orchids. Roots need water and air. So how dry should the roots be allowed to get before watering again for that genera/species/hybrid? Dry? almost dry? keep moist but not sopping wet? Whatever it is, that's the happy place for those roots/that orchid!
- 5. Preventing problems is much, much, easier than bringing back a deteriorated orchid.

That's all for now. There's more to it all of course and always exceptions. May black rot and other uglies stay away from your orchids this summer and forever.



The Cattleya Alliance - Easily Cross with One Another to Produce Many Primary & Intergeneric Hybrids

• Brassocattleya (Bc.) = (Brassavola x Cattleya)

• Brassolaeliocattleya (Blc.)=(Brassavola x Laelia x Cattleya) now Rhyncholaeliocattleya (Rlc.)

• Guarianthe (Gur.) Natural genus

• Sophrocattleya (Sc.) = (Sophronitis x Cattleya) now Cattleya

• Sophrolaeliocattleya (Slc.) = (Sophronitis x Laelia x Cattleya) now mostly Cattleya

• Cattleytonia (Ctna.) = (Broughtonia x Cattleya)

• Epicattleya (Epc.) = (Epidendrum x Cattleya)

• Epilaeliocattleya (Eplc.)=(Epidendrum x Laelia x Cattleya)

• Brassoepidendrum (Bepi.) = (Brassavola x Epidendrum)

• Potinara (Pot.) = (Brassavola × Cattleya × Laelia × Sophronitis)

now Rhyncholaeliocattleya (Rlc.) or Rhyncattleanthe (Rth.)



SUMMARY OF SANDI'S PRESENTATION ON THE CATTLEYA ALLIANCE

- 1. **LIGHT**: Prefer very bright light 3,000 to 5,000 foot-candles. Light is important for healthy growth and flower production. Seasonal turning may be needed but not when in bud if plant is phototropic.
- 2. **AIR:** Must have good air circulation to prevent fungal infections, spaced far enough apart for "a cat to walk between them". Fans should run 24/7.
- 3. **WATER**: Water thoroughly but allow to dry out between waterings, once or twice a week depending up the season and the planting media which should be open/porous.
- 4. FERTILIZER: well-balanced with micronutrients about once a week 'weakly' at ½ strength or full strength less often. ADDITIVES: seaweed extract eg. Maxicrop soluble powder; micronutrients eg. NilocG Aquatics, Millers Microplex; calcium/magnesium eg Technaflora TFMC4L Mag; silicone eg Dyna-Gro Pro-TeKt (this should be added after any other items are mixed).
- POTTING MEDIUM: FAST DRAINING! Eg: sponge rock, clay pebble eg Hydroton or Aliflor, tree fern fiber.
